**Please don't miss the Easter Triduum** (Thurs 28th March to Sun 31st March)

The Easter Triduum is the shortest season of the liturgical year. The word Triduum is Latin for 3 days. It is the most solemn season and the highest point of the entire liturgical year. Triduum begins with the evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, and ends with Evening Prayer on Easter Sunday. It includes the Celebration of the Lord's Passion and Adoration of the Holy Cross on Good Friday, the Easter Vigil in the evening of Holy Saturday, and the celebration of Mass on Easter Sunday.

## The Governance of the Parish

As parish priest I am ultimately responsible for the running of St Mary's, Parish, however, I cannot do this alone with any great effectiveness given the size of the parish and the renovation project currently underway. Also, moving the parish from 'maintenance to mission' requires good leadership but also collaborative ministry from every single parishioner.

To help move the parish from maintenance to mission I have enlisted the help of James Murphie (trainee deacon), Marian Milne (sacristan); Moira Leck; James Milne and Anne Hampton. These faithful parishioners form the Parish Leadership Team whom I meet every Monday for 2 hours to discuss what's going on in the parish and decisions that have to be made.

This does not mean that the Parish Council is defunct, however, it does mean that it's primary function is reporting to me what's happening in the parish.

Another important aspect of Parish Administration at this time is management of the Restoration Project. This has evolved over the last year to entail a Restoration Steering Group (a large group involved with fundraising, advertising and liaising with partner groups) and a Restoration Core Group (a small group that liaises with Maria Ogden [grant consultant] and then feeds back to the larger group. Without the help of all those people in the Leadership Team, Parish Council, Restoration Steering Group and Restoration Core Group it would be impossible to run St Mary's. At this juncture we also need to acknowledge the support of the Diocesan Curia especially John O'Meara (Diocesan Property Manager) and Melissa Walton (Diocesan Accountant). If you feel that you have any skills that could be used in the running of St Mary's please speak with Fr Jim, or any member of the Leadership Team.

### Thanks to all those who took part in the Ministries Morning.

The feedback from the workshop leaders was positive.

Suggestions that came from the Readers group that will be adopted:

- Readers sit together at the front and after reading go back to their own place.
- Two seats have been placed behind the Lectern for the cantor and 2<sup>nd</sup> reader.
- The following Sunday's readings will be noted in the Newsletter.
- Readers' bow to the priest on approaching the altar, and to the altar with the priest when leaving.
- Reading at a slow pace is best.
- A readers' night will be arranged in the Church for practise and feedback. This will take place Tues 19th March at 7pm in St Mary's Church. **All readers please attend** as this will assure uniformity in practise.

In the near future there will be another session for the Welcome Ministers after Sunday Mass.

The Architects have now provided us with a timetable for Phase 1 of the Restoration Project: the Exterior of the Church. Work is due to start in August 2024 with the majority of the work being completed by March 2025.

Phase 2 would be the hall; Phase 3 the interior of the church; and Phase 4 the Church House.

Working with other partners is an integral part of St Mary's Restoration Project. To this end Professor Graham Morton will be bringing students from Dundee University to visit and explore St Mary's history, architecture, and social engagement on Friday 15th March.

Between September 9th and 11th Forgotten Skills Workshops will take place at St Mary's involving pupils from 3 local Secondary Schools.

A Church Maintenance Course will be hosted by St Mary's on Wednesday 25th September and led by the project architect.

## The Restoration Wall

Thanks to the fantastic success of the 'Buy a Brick' appeal, we have now sold all of our full bricks. As a result, we have now decided to release the perimeter half bricks for sale for the reduced price of £25 (due to the smaller surface area thus accommodating fewer character).

We are in the process of producing new order forms and as such, we will not be taking any further orders over this weekend (24th / 25th February 2024). We hope that the new forms will be ready for next weekend (2nd / 3rd March 2024) at which time we will ne taking orders for half bricks only. Please note that the number of characters and words on these blocks with be significantly reduced compared with the full bricks.

Thereafter, we plan to extend the current wall to accommodate more full bricks. This may take a number of weeks to implement, therefore we will not be taking any more orders for full bricks until such at time the extension is in position. We will provide an update nearer the time.

We apologise for any inconvenience this may cause and ask for your patience in the interim.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your kindness and extremely generous donations. The wall looks fantastic and has been admired by many. The wall has raised £8,600 so far for St Mary's Restoration Fund.

## Glancing Thoughts—The Instruction Manual

In the First Reading, God gives Moses and the Israelites the ten commandments. These are God's basic instruction manual for life. In Christ's Sermon on the Mount (Mt 5 through 7), that basic instruction manual is supplied with more details. The ten commandments forbid murder. The Sermon on the Mount commands you actually to love your enemy, turn the other cheek to him, and so on.

The rules of God's instruction manual for us are helpful; but, as we all have learned, it is hard to know in what circumstances they apply. Suppose you take the commandment about turning the other cheek to apply to someone who is beating his wife. If you apply it to mean that you should not try to stop him, you will simply be cooperating with his evil.

The trick is to see that the commandment about turning the other cheek has to be applied in the context of the broader rule: love your enemy. If you enable your enemy to become more evil, how have you loved him?

Elsewhere in the Gospel (John 2:15), Christ uses a whip to chase the moneychangers out of the Temple. In doing this he helps us understand how to apply the rules. In cases where turning the other cheek would make your enemy worse instead of better, loving your enemy requires helping him to stop his evil in some other way. And that is why the same Christ who gave the Sermon on the Mount drives out the moneychangers. If he had turned the other cheek to them, he would have been an enabler of their evil. Instead, it is good for them, as well as for others, that they stop the evil they were doing. And so Christ uses force to get them to stop.

Here is the thing to notice, then. God's instruction manual for life is not limited just to the sets of rules in the ten commandments and the Sermon on the Mount. There is a medieval saying: every act of Christ is a teaching for us (Omnis Christi actio nostra est instructio).<sup>\*</sup> Christ's life and actions, as they are set out in the Gospels, are our best help for seeing how to live our lives well. Our best instruction manual is Christ himself.
