The Governance of the Parish

As parish priest I am ultimately responsible for the running of St Mary's, Parish, however, I cannot do this alone with any great effectiveness given the size of the parish and the renovation project currently underway. Also, moving the parish from 'maintenance to mission' requires good leadership but also collaborative ministry from every single parishioner.

To help move the parish from maintenance to mission I have enlisted the help of James Murphie (trainee deacon), Marian Milne (sacristan); Moira Leck; James Milne and Anne Hampton. These faithful parishioners form the Parish Leadership Team which I meet every Monday for 2 hours to discuss what's going on in the parish and decisions that have to be made.

This does not mean that the Parish Council is defunct, however, it does mean that it's primary function is reporting to me what's happening in the parish.

Another important aspect of Parish Administration at this time is management of the Restoration Project. This has evolved over the last year to entail a Restoration Steering Group (a large group involved with fundraising, advertising and liaising with partner groups) and a Restoration Core Group (a small group that liaises with Maria Ogden [grant consultant] and then feeds back to the larger group. Without the help of all those people in the Leadership Team, Parish Council, Restoration Steering Group and Restoration Core Group it would be impossible to run St Mary's. At this juncture we also need to acknowledge the support of the Diocesan Curia especially John O'Meara (Diocesan Property Manager) and Melissa Walton (Diocesan Accountant). If you feel that you have any skills that could be used in the running of St Mary's please speak with Fr Jim, or any member of the Leadership Team.

The Restoration Wall

Thanks to the fantastic success of the 'Buy a Brick' appeal, we have now sold all of our full bricks. As a result, we have now decided to release the perimeter half bricks for sale for the reduced price of £25 (due to the smaller surface area thus accommodating fewer character).

We are in the process of producing new order forms and as such, we will not be taking any further orders . We hope that the new forms will be ready for next weekend (2nd / 3rd March 2024) at which time we will be taking orders for half bricks only. Please note that the number of characters and words on these blocks with be significantly reduced compared with the full bricks.

Thereafter, we plan to extend the current wall to accommodate more full bricks. This may take a number of weeks to implement, therefore we will not be taking any more orders for full bricks until such at time the extension is in position. We will provide an update nearer the time.

We apologise for any inconvenience this may cause and ask for your patience in the interim.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your kindness and extremely generous donations. The wall looks fantastic and has been admired by many. The wall has raised £8,600 so far for St Mary's Restoration Fund.

Glancing Thoughts—Heartbreak

As the First Reading describes it, the enemies of the Jews smash Jerusalem. The walls of the city are torn down. The Temple of God is burned up, and all its holy things are destroyed. And the people are taken captive to Babylon. It's all lost, their country, their customs, their language, their cult, their Temple.

In the Psalm, there is a poignant picture of the people's heartbreak over this destruction of their home. The enemies who had wrecked Jerusalem wanted the Jews to sing Hebrew songs for them. "How can we sing the Lord's songs in a strange land," the captive people say to themselves in their grief.

The Second Reading declares that God is rich in mercy and great in love. So why doesn't God protect his people from the heartbreak that his people had when Jerusalem was destroyed? The answer to the question lies in the Readings.

God doesn't want to destroy people and God doesn't allow suffering for the sake of hurting people either. Instead, God is looking for a remedy, as the First Reading implies. God is willing to use desperate measures, even the heartbreak of his people, to save them.

And not only that, but God is willing to use his own suffering too. As the Gospel Reading says, God gave his beloved Son to save the world. Christ was betrayed by his disciples, shamed in front of his family and friends, mocked by his community, condemned by the legal authorities, publicly flogged, and put to death by crucifixion. Any one of these things is enough for heartbreak, isn't it? And so, in the incarnate Christ, God uses his own great suffering as the final remedy to bring people from death into life, when all other remedies have been tried and failed. Heartbreak by us, by Christ, is for life not for death.

And here is what else we need to see. Jerusalem was rebuilt and the Temple was restored, as the First Reading explains. Christ's death was followed by his resurrection. In each of these cases, heartbreak was turned into joy.

And so heartbreak is not the last word. Elsewhere (Ps 37:3-4) the Psalmist says, "put your trust in the Lord, … and he will give you the desires of your heart." When the story is God's, heartbreak is not the end of the story. Joy in finding your heart's desire is.
