




The Cabrini Pledge

As Catholics, we are called to recognize the face of Christ in each person we encounter, especially the poor and vulnerable. Jesus tells us in his own words: "For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me, naked and you clothed me, ill and you cared for me, in prison and you visited me" (Matthew 25:35). The Gospel and the social teaching of the Church continually afDirm the equal dignity of every person, irrespective of race, nationality, or immigration status.

The Cabrini Pledge is both a reminder of our immigrant heritage and a call to deeper engagement with our faith in response to current events. At a time when our culture is dominated by deep political divisions and reasonable disagreements about immigration policy, progress can feel impossible. But by witnessing to the God-given dignity of every person, including the migrants and refugees in our midst, we pave the way for an approach rooted in mercy, justice, and the common good. And together, like Mother Cabrini, we can be keepers of hope.

I PLEDGE:

- To affirm, in word and deed, the inherent dignity of every person, regardless of immigra-•on status or country of origin, seeing each as a child of God before all else.
- To engage with Scripture and the Church's social teaching, reflecong on the role of migra-on in salvaon history, the history of the United States, and the history of my own family.
- To listen and learn about the circumstances facing migrants and refugees, including those in my community, with an open heart and mind.
- To seek opportuni es for encounter, so as to grow in deeper understanding and communion that leads to an authen c solidarity with those in need.
- · To consider what it means to be a good neighbor and how I am called to reflect the love and hope of Christ to others.
- To encourage civic dialogue that places the human person and the sancety of families at the center of policymaking, especially toward the end of meaningful immigraeon reform.
- · To join with Pope Leo in praying for all migrants and refugees as fellow travelers on the journey to our true homeland.

Pope Leo's Message for World Day of Migrants and Refugees on 4-5 October:

Migrants are 'witnesses of hope' in a devastated world

In his Message for the 111th World Day of Migrants and Refugees, released on Friday, Pope Leo XIV emphasizes the important witness that migrants and refugees offer in a world affected by conblict and inequality in hoping and searching for a better and more peaceful future.



This annual event encourages the faithful to show support and closeness to the millions of people who are forced to leave their homes and places of origin. According to the United Nations, at the end of 2024, around 123.4 million people were forcibly displaced across the world due to persecution, con-blict, violence or other issues.

Pope Leo XIV begins his Message underlining how the world is "faced with frightening scenarios and the possibility of global devastation".

"The prospect of a renewed arms race and the development of new armaments, including nuclear weapons, the lack of consideration for the harmful effects of the ongoing climate crisis, and the impact of profound economic inequalities make the challenges of the present and the future increasingly demanding", he explained, adding that these issues have forced millions to leave their homelands.

He points out that the "widespread tendency" to look at "the interests of limited communities" poses a threat to sharing "responsibility, multilateral cooperation, the pursuit of the common good and global solidarity".

For Pope Leo, "it is important there be a growing desire in people's hearts for a future of peace and of respect for the dignity of all". He stresses that "such a future is essential to God's plan for humanity and the rest of creation", citing passages from the biblical book of Zechariah emphasizing that, as Christians, "we believe and hope in its full realization, for the Lord is always faithful to His promises".

The Pope explains that migrants and refugees thus have an important role to play in showing hope in a better future. For the Catholic Church, "the virtue of hope responds to the aspiration to happiness which God has placed in the heart of every man and woman"; and this search is "certainly one of the main motivations" for migrants, refugees and displaced persons, making them "messengers" and "privileged witnesses of hope".

"Indeed, they demonstrate this daily through their resilience and trust in God, as they face adversity while seeking a future in which they glimpse that integral human development and happiness are possible", he says, comparing the experience of the people of Israel described in the Bible.

"In a world darkened by war and injustice, even when all seems lost", he stresses, "their courage and tenacity bear heroic testimony to a faith that sees beyond what our eyes can see and gives them the strength to defy death on the various contemporary migration routes".

At the same time, Pope Leo explains that communities that welcome migrants and refugees can also be "a living witness to hope" as they show "the promise of a present and a future where the dignity of all as children of God is recognized".

"In this way, migrants and refugees are recognized as brothers and sisters, part of a family in which they can express their talents and participate fully in community life", he says.

On a spiritual level, Pope Leo highlights that migrants and refugees also remind the Church "of her pilgrim dimension, perpetually journeying towards her Đinal homeland, sustained by a hope that is a theological virtue". He encourages the Church and its members to be "God's people journeying towards the heavenly homeland" and avoid the "temptation of 'sedentarization'" and becoming "of the world".

In this regard, the Pope believes Catholic migrants and refugees have a special mission in becoming "missionaries of hope in the countries that welcome them, forging new paths of faith where the message of Jesus Christ has not yet ar rived or initiating interreligious dialogue based on everyday life and the search for common values".

"This is a true missio migrantium, a mission carried out by migrants, for which adequate preparation and ongoing sup port must be ensured through effective inter-ecclesial cooperation", he says.

"With their spiritual enthusiasm and vitality, they can help revitalize ecclesial communities that have become rigid and weighed down, where spiritual desertiDication is advancing at an alarming rate", he says. "Their presence, then, should be recognized and appreciated as a true divine blessing, an opportunity to open oneself to the grace of God, who gives new energy and hope to His Church". Message of the Holy Father for the 111th World Day of Migrants and Refugees 2025

A Man Just Like Me

In the Gospel Reading, Jesus tells a parable about a man who goes to hell. (Traditionally, the man is called 'Dives', because 'dives' means 'rich man'.) In the parable, Dives is beautifully dressed and eats very well. At his door is a beggar, Lazarus, who is clothed in sores and very hungry.

If the point of the parable is to give us a warning about a sin that can send a person to hell, the parable ought to highlight that sin. But notice that the parable doesn't actually tell us whether Lazarus gets any food from Dives. Notice too that if not feeding the hungry is Dives's sin, then the parable could stop near its beginning. But it doesn't. It goes on for a good while.

In hell, Dives notices Lazarus comforted in the bosom of Abraham, and he says to Abraham: send Lazarus to bring me a little water.

Here Dives is talking to Abraham, not to Lazarus; and he is asking Abraham to *command* Lazarus. He wants Abraham to make Lazarus leave the comfort of Abraham's bosom, Đind his way into the Đlames of hell, and bring a bit of water to Dives, who will be thirsty again almost immediately. Clearly, Dives thinks no trouble for Lazarus is too much if it brings a little something for Dives.

When Abraham won't agree to this request of Dives's, Dives makes another one. He asks Abraham to send Lazarus to Dives' brothers, to warn them. Dives still is talking only to Abraham. He spares a thought for Lazarus only when he is Diguring out how to make use of him. If not for bringing water to hell, then why not for bringing messages to earth?

And now we can see the sin of Dives, can't we? Lazarus is a man just like Dives, but Dives can't see it. Dives doesn't talk to Lazarus, because he doesn't see Lazarus as a person in his own right. Insofar as he thinks of Lazarus at all, it is only to calculate how Lazarus could be used to beneĐit himself.

It wouldn't matter if he had fed Lazarus when they were both living, if he had fed him in this.
